Historical Collections Gallery made possible thanks to Pappas family

We are pleased to share an exciting update on the Historical Collections gallery fundraising efforts. Dr. Dennis G. Pappas, Sr., (pictured) and Dr. Dennis G. Pappas, Jr., have donated a generous gift for the construction of the Historical Collections gallery. The gallery will be named in honor of Dr. Pappas, Sr., and plans are already underway to begin construction of the new space. Dr. Dennis G. Pappas, Sr., has been a long-time supporter, donor and friend of the UAB Libraries' Historical Collections.

In 2010, Dr. Pappas, Sr., donated 125 rare books related to the history of otolaryngology, which laid the foundation for the "Dennis G. Pappas Otolaryngology Collection." collection of rare books, along with medical instruments donated by Dr. Pappas, has continued to grow over the years and is an invaluable historical resource as well as a testament of Dr. Pappas' ongoing care and support of the collections. In an introduction to the annotated bibliography to this collection, Dr. Pappas states: "Such books and instruments, never independent of the philosophy of its



age, were not considered antiques, but works of art, history, and culture, that have faced the challenge of the past and can give insights to rewarding findings of the future." The supportive role that Dr. Pappas has played over the years exemplifies his philosophy and his vision to see these collections preserved, celebrated, and promoted within the coming gallery space. 
Coming Soon: New book to highlight the history of surgery, contributions of Dr. Arnold G. Diethelm




Update: 2024 RFHL Annual Lecture

We are pleased to announce that Dr. Jayme E. Locke will be giving the 51st Annual Reynolds-Finley Lecture on Friday, February 23, 2024, at 4 p.m.

Dr. Locke is the Director of the UAB Comprehensive Transplant Institute and the Arnold G. Diethelm Endowed Chair in Transplantation Surgery. More details about this event and her lecture topic to follow.





Collections

The Reynolds-Finley Historical Library continues to add to its robust and diverse collections pertaining to the history of the health sciences.

An early work on the history of women's health was acquired, titled I secreti Della Signora Isabella to a female author, providing advice to women on health and hygiene.

Additionally, De medicina Aegyptiorum libri quatuor (1645), by Prospero Alpini, was purchased for the library and is the first European work on Egyptian medicine.

There also was an important work (along with several others) added to the recently established African American Medical Collection. Let there be life: the contemporary account of Edna L. Griffin, M. D. (1947), by Helen Kitchen Branson, traces the hard journey of the first Black female physician in Pasadena, California, as she and many of her patients navigated racial discrimination. These are just some of the additions to the ever-growing collections. ■

University Archives featured material for coronation of King Charles III

Archives staff pulled together material from several collections to mark the coronation of King Charles III.

On May 6, 2023, Charles III was crowned in Westminster Abbey in London, the 40th monarch to be crowned in the Abbey. While a UAB connection would seem to be rather unlikely, there are materials directly related to the king and his family in several archival collections.

In the collection of Dr. Joseph F. Volker are 1940s photographs of Buckingham Palace and of Westminster Abbey from Volker's travels in post-war Europe as part of the medical teaching missions of the Unitarian Service Committee.

Another collection that has an interesting item is that of Dr. Emmett B. Carmichael, chair of the biochemistry department and one of the founders of University Libraries' Alabama Museum of the Health Sciences. Carmichael acquired a first-day-of-issue commemorative stamp created for the investiture of Charles as the 21st Prince of Wales on July 1, 1969; the accompanying commemorative envelope was postmarked that day at Caernarvon, Wales, location of the investiture ceremony.

But the collection which has the most material is that of James F. "Jimmy" Hatcher, a member of the university faculty for four decades (Department of Theatre) and the founding director of the UAB Town and Gown Theatre. Hatcher took several trips to Britain, and his collection includes a vast amount of

New Positions in Historical Collections

UAB Archivist

A search committee has been formed to recruit a new faculty member for University Archives. The position will report to the University Archivist and will be a member of the HC team. The Archivist will participate in all aspects of the daily activities in University Archives and will work closely with the Digitization and Digital Preservation staff within UAB Libraries. The search committee is comprised by members of the HC team and by employees from across University Libraries; the University Archivist is the committee chair.

AMHS Collections Manager

This fall, the Alabama Museum of the Health Sciences will begin the process of hiring a Collections Manager. A museum collections manager implements collections stewardship policies, practices, and procedures in accordance with the ethics and guidelines of the American Alliance of Museum. This new position will be an integral member of the team supporting the day-to-day management of the collection and museum.
